<b>Course objectives</b>	Familiarization with the basic forms and history of the language of the source texts of the New Testament and of the Greek corpus of Patristic literature. Familiarization with Greek writing. Mastery of Greek pronunciation. Mastery of basic grammar norms of the Greek language with an emphasis on phonetics and morphology. Learning how to read sentences and understand simple textual units in use. Acquisition of necessary skills for further study of the syntax, scholarly terminology, and translation techniques for the Greek language.			
<b>Learning outcomes</b>	Development of basic knowledge of normative Greek grammar, with an emphasis on phonetics and morphology. Familiarization with aspects of the Greek language that are specific to the κοινή and New Testament dialects. Enabling students for independent grammatical analysis of sentences and short textual units (adapted as necessary) of the source texts of the New Testament.			
<b>Course content</b>				
<b>Lectures</b>	Acquisition of basic knowledge of the Greek language and its particular form in the New Testament, its historical development, corresponding literature, and lexicographical guides. Acquisition of basic theoretical knowledge of the Greek language as an ancient literary and sacred language. Ancient Hellenes and their significance for the establishment of Hellenic and European culture, with particular attention given to philosophy and sacred terminology necessary for studying theology. Greek writing. Pronunciation. Declensions: nouns (A declension, O declension, third declension– vowel and consonant basics), adjectives (all three declensions;; comparative adjectives), pronouns and variable numbers. Construction of adverbial forms. Conjugation of verbs (construction and meaning of O and –μι verb forms). Examination of indeclinable words and their basic functions in sentences. Familiarization with lexicographical guides and other relevant literature.			
<b>Practical classes (exercises, additional forms of classes, research work)</b>	Application of knowledge acquired in lectures in applied work with course texts.
